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Course Description:

A supervised practical experience with a community or social agency related to the student's interest and/or future plans. Readings, written assignments and group meetings will help students reflect on and integrate knowledge with practical experience. Please ensure you have assigned chapter readings completed before class as well as assigned exercises from the text.

Written Assignment:

Students will write a five-page paper that applies relevant theoretical and/ or methodological knowledge to their practicum experiences. The format for the paper should follow the guidelines of the new *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association*.

You will be marked along the dimensions set out in the written assignment evaluation sheet. Please attach this sheet to your final copy of your paper before it is handed in for marking. Please identify, on the first or cover page of your assignments, the course name, the instructor's name and your own name, along with your student ID number and mailbox number.

Journal

Your journal should contain a record of your volunteering activities and personal experiences. You should incorporate your reactions (emotional and cognitive) to practicum experiences in a manner that is critically reflective and exploratory in nature. The journal will also include your responses to the assigned exercises from the text and class. Finally, each week you will be responsible for finding a journal article or book chapter related to your practicum setting. You will need to summarize the reading's main points and apply it to your practicum experience.
