Course Description

This course examines the moral and legal concerns related to a variety of health related services, research programs, and medical interventions. Issues to be examined include, but are not limited to, abortion, euthanasia, genetic engineering, stem cell research, reproductive technology, commodification of organs and bodily tissue, patient consent, and the distribution of scarce medical resources.

Expected Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students should be able to understand and articulate a range of normative moral perspectives on a host of practical medical, health, and wellness related issues.
- 2. Students should appreciate the broad metaphysical and epistemological contours that give shape to bioethical considerations and issues. Bioethics is always done at the intersection of science/nature and values/*supra*nature, and students should be able to think reasonably and responsibly in the midst of these exchanges.
- 3. Students should come to understand a broad spectrum of views related to human well being across the life span. Students should be able to articulately and philosophically explain key concepts like "life", "wellness", "disease", and "death", etc.

4. Students should be able to recognize the legal and political implications of bioethical concerns. Students should be able to appreciate how legal theory, legislation, and public policy can give shape and direction to bioethical conversation. In turn, students should be inspired and motivated to apply their reasonably cultivated philosophical reflections in related areas of law and public policy, as well as private individual decision making.

Requirements:

- 1. Attendance and Participation
- Please make every effort to be seated and prepared for class by 11:15 PM. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of most, if not all, classes. Students are expected to attend each class session with <u>an engaged frame of mind</u>. Students should be prepared to contribute <u>thoughtful</u> conversation to the topics under discussion. <u>Absence from class may result in a deduction of 1 mark.</u> Class participation is assessed on the balance. Students whose attendance is perfect but who are otherwise unconversant with class material and discussion should anticipate a C+ (10.5/15) for this portion of their grade.
- Students may enhance their participation grade by contributing commentary and analysis to online discussion forums found on Moodle.
- Students physically in class but otherwise engaged in non-class activities are simply in the same room and may be assessed as absent. This can negatively affect participation evaluation as well. Students who regularly arrive late, leave in the middle, or depart early may be marked as absent.

Registration

Students will not receive a tuition refund for courses from which they withdraw after the Registration Revision period. A grade of "W" will appear on their transcript.

Students wishing to withdraw from a course, but who fail to do so by the applicable date, will receive the grade earned in accordance with the course syllabus. A student obliged to withdraw from a course after the Withdrawal Deadline because of health or other reasons may apply to the Registrar for special consideration.

Exam Scheduling

Students, who find a conflict in their exam schedule must submit a Revised Examination Request form to the Registrar's Office by the deadline date; please consult the List of Important Dates. Requests will be considered for the following reasons only: 1) the scheduled final examination slot conflicts with another exam; 2) the student has three final exams within three consecutive exam time blocks; 3) the scheduled final exam slot conflicts with an exam at another institution; 4) extenuating circumstances. Travel is not considered a valid excuse for re-scheduling or missing a final exam.

Electronic Etiquette

Students are expected to treat their instructor, guest speakers, and fellow students with respect. It is disruptive to the learning goals of a course or seminar and disrespectful to fellow students and the instructor to use electronics for purposes unrelated to the course during a class session. Course extensions are only granted for serious issues that arise "due to circumstances beyond the student's control."

Appeal of Grade

An appeal for change of grade on any course work must be made to the course instructor within one week of receiving notification of the grade. An appeal for change of final grade must be submitted to the Registrar's Office in writing and providing the basis for appeal within 30 days of receiving notification of the final grade, providing the basis for appeal. A review fee of \$50.00 must accompany the appeal. If the appeal is sustained, the fee will be refunded.

Academic Integrity
