Canadian Nazarene College BL 240a (UoC, RELS 301) Introduction to the Bible SYLLABUS, Fall Term 1999

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I. Course Objectives

This course is an introduction to the literature of the Bible, beginning with the Old Testament this autumn and the New Testament in the winter. Our goal is to become conscious of the major issues that are encountered in studying and interpreting the biblical text itself. In the course of the year we will discuss a wide variety of matters as they relate to the biblical story: theology, hermeneutics, history, language, literary art, faith; all in the context of the biblical literature. The overall objective is to improve your ability to read and understand the Bible in a way that does justice to the literature.

Examples of typed class notes

BL 240a (UoC, RELS 301) Introduction to the Bible Study Paper Assignment Fall Term, 1999

The purpose of this paper is to get you to read a biblical narrative carefully and observantly (NRSV is the required text). Choose an individual from the list provided and conduct a character study of that individual in the OT. Your sole source of information will be the biblical narratives about that person. Make a photocopy of the relevant text(s) and then read and reread them until you know the story intimately. Your writing assignment is to analyze the story for plot, character development, conflict and theology. Thus, your paper should have four headings:

Plot: Describe the plot briefly, i.e. distill the story line down to its most basic elements. Then ask: How does it work? What are the main turning points? What are the features that make it dramatically appealing? Why was this story good enough to be preserved for thousands of years?

Characters: Do a character sketch of each of the individuals in the story. Describe what you know about this individual and how you know it, from the text. Include a character sketch of God and treat him as any other character you do not know.

Overriding emotions: Analyze the text specifically for its emotional impact on the reader. Look for tension, conflict, anger, pain, victory, joy etc. and describe how these are developed and presented by the author.

Theology: What is this story designed to teach about God and what moral, ethical or spiritual lesson is the reader intended to take from it?

The paper must be typed and double-spaced and should be 6-10 pages in length. If you read you text carefully and get into the story you will probably feel that this is not enough space. Pay careful attention to spelling, grammar and the visual appeal of your paper. Your choices for topic are:
