Description

A study of the history and theology of the Exile and Restoration in Judah. The focus will be on books and passages which describe and prescribe the response to the fall of Judah and the restoration of the community with particular attention to the content, literary form, historical context and theological teaching of the books of Ezra-Nehemiah, Lamentations, Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi.

Evaluation

Welcome to the smorgasbord! Pick up your tray and get ready for a feast. The students will be given the opportunity to learn in the way that best suits their own learning style. There will be a core of assignments (Basic Food Groups) that all students will be required to accomplish, but beyond that core (Appetizers, Desserts, Beverages) there will be freedom to design the learning experiences according to the student's own desires. The student will not only choose the type of assignment but also the due dates for those assignments (except for exams).

Basic Food Groups (40%)

- Read Newsome's book and trace the history of the ANE and the Jews (due after reading week): 15%
- Read Klein's book and trace the reaction to the exile in the books covered in chapters 1-5 (due the last day of class): 15%
- Participation & Preparation: 10%

Appetizers, Desserts, Beverages (60%)

Choose up to 60% of items desirable to your palate. You can assign your own due date to these assignments, but no month can have more than two of these items due in it.

- Exams (20%) 2 offered
 - #1 Historical-Geographical (mid-term: week after Reading Week)
 - #2 Literary-Theological (finals week)
- Essay: 5-6 pages (20%) limit 2

This assignment will address a small issue (usually historical) in the Babylonian and Persian Periods or books.

Historical Figure paper: 5-6 pages (20%): limit 1

This assignment allows the students to concentrate their attention on a particular historical figure in the ANE context.

Book Review: 3 pages (10%) limit 2

Books which address different issues which arise in this course will be read and reviewed by the student.

Article Set Review: 3 page (10%) limit 2

Each set of articles will address a different issue of debate relevant to the course. This assignment will require that the student read the articles, identify the major areas of debate citing different viewpoints, and then come to a conclusion.

Research paper: 10-12 pages (40%) limit 1

This assignment will require a high level of research on a major issue relevant to the course. Interaction with secondary literature will be expected.

Archaeological site paper (6th century BC): 5-6 pages (20%) limit 1

The student will focus attention on the archaeological evidence for a particular site in the ANE relevant to the course.

Sermon: 10 pages (20%) limit 1

In this assignment the student will focus attention on a particular passage relevant to the course, perform proper exegesis on the text which will form the foundation for the written text of a sermon.

A Word of Caution

Books used in the course are not chosen always for their "orthodoxy". There are very few books on the market today which I would agree with on every point. You will read in both Newsome and Klein about such texts as "Deutero-Isaiah" or the "Priestly" text of the Pentateuch or of the Deuteronomic additions to the book of Jeremiah. Do not let these statements deter you in your quest for knowledge. Rather read them for the message of these texts no matter what your views are on these controversial issues. Basically, do not throw out the baby with the bath water!

Essay: 5-6 pages (20%) limit 2

- 3. Content: Are all the points considered?
