Course Description

Students assume responsibility for a specific dance performance role in a program production as designated by the director, choreographer, or department or program director. Students can take up to three credits per year for a maximum of six elective credits.

Program Outcomes

Ambrose Arts' Dance Minor and courses in dance are designed to deepen each student's understanding of dance and to grow dance skillfulness. Students receive training in the tenets of dance history, applied practice, and choreographic skills, while being encouraged to explore the intersection of their faith and art. Outcomes are divided into three areas of competency:

The Dancer's CRAFT OUTCOMES

- 1. A physical and conceptual understanding of the dance form
- 2. The ability to engage in creative and critical response process in dance
- 3. Perform choreography as part of **collaborative events** that include the music and/or theatre program at Ambrose Arts

The Dancer's CAREER OUTCOMES

1. Build personal dance capacity within any future career

The Dancer's CHARACTER OUTCOMES

- 1. Demonstrate an integration of art and faith in life and practice
- 2. Examine the role of dance as a tool for therapy, social justice, and religious expression

Expected Course Learning Outcomes

The successful student will:

- 1. Gain further experience in performance collaboration.
- 2. Deepen experience in one or more dance disciplines (ballet, modern, or other choreographic styles)
- 3. Successfully fulfill the designated responsibilities of a dance role in a program production as assigned.
- 4. Gain experience mentoring students from DA 103 where appropriate.

^{*}The highlighted date of October 28th is the only Thursday collaborative rehearsal. Time of day for this rehearsal will be decided upon between students and the instructor within the first week of classes.

Requirements:

- 1. Collaborative Rehearsals: attendance and intentional participation in collaborative rehearsal times. See attendance policy for more information.
- 2. Dress Rehearsal and Performance: this class will work towards a collaborative performance with the Ambrose Orchestra and Ambrose Ballet class, to be presented on November 5th at St. Stephen's Anglican Church. Dress Rehearsal will be held the evening before on November 4th. **Failure to participate in both the dress rehearsal and performance will result in failure of the course.**
- 3. Journal: reflective writing on each rehearsal, creative brainstorming, concept research, phrase and music mapping, as well as critical writing about the performance experience. Student Journal is to be brought to every class and should be a lined coil notebook, 8 ½ x 11 in size. Submission of journal in person to the instructor for grading will be October 12th and November 16th. There should be one entry per class, and one entry per independent movement creation period. (16 in total) Be sure to cite any sources referenced in your journal using a citation format you are familiar with, APA would be preferrable.
- 4. Independent Movement Creation: the exploration of movement ideas outside of class, resulting in 16 counts of choreography. This will be created in advance of class time and will be shared and built upon for solo movement sections. Movement creations will be shared in the following collaborative rehearsals: September 21st, 28th and October 5th, 12th, 19th, 26th.

Attendance:

Attendance is required for all collaborative rehearsals, dress rehearsals and performances, as it not only impacts individual growth, but also collaborative work with peers. Any lateness or absence will be reflected in the student's participation grade.

Absences due to illness or emergency need to be communicated to the instructor as soon as possible and will require making up lost time and missed assignments before the following week. If a student has three absences, this will lead to failing the course. A late entry to class accounts for half an absence.

Because of the nature of the Alpha 4.00 system, there can be no uniform University-wide conversion scale. The relationship between raw scores (e.g. percentages) and the resultant letter grade will depend on the nature of the course and the instructor's assessment of the level of each class, compared to similar classes taught previously.

Communication

All students have received an Ambrose e-mail account upon registration. Exam Scheduling

Coursework Extensions

Should a request for a time extension on coursework exceed the end of the term, a *Coursework Extension Application* must be completed and submitted to the Office of the Registrar. The extension (if granted) will be recorded on the student record. Extensions are granted at the discretion of the instructor and are normally granted for 30 days beyond the last day of the term.

Normally, Course Extension Applications will be considered only when all of the following conditions are met:

- the quality of prior course work has been satisfactory;
- circumstances beyond your control, such as an extended illness or death of a family member, make it impossible for you to complete the course work on time; and
- you submit Coursework Extension Application to the Office of the Registrar on or before the deadline specified in the Academic Schedule.

If granted, time extensions do not excuse you from a final examination where one has been scheduled for the course.

A temporary grade of TX will be assigned until a final grade is submitted in accordance with the new deadline. A final grade of F will apply to:

 all course work submitted after the end of the semester unless a coursework extension has been granted; and all course work submitted after the revised due date provided by an approved extension to coursework.
