# **Course Description**

An exploration of specific dance styles outside the domain of ballet and modern technique courses. The work will be practical and include elements of theory as it pertains to the particular dance style. The course will include at least two distinct dance forms, which will vary by given term, such as Hip Hop, Jazz, Musical Theatre, Acro, Aerial, Flamenco, or others.

Attendance at a dance event is required. We will be attending Ephemeral Artifacts: Travis Knights in-person on Thursday, February 2, at 7:30 pm at the DJD Dance Centre. Please be prepared in advance to participate in this group outing.

- 2. Recognize music artists, compositions, and types of jazz, funk, and swing dance music.

- 3. Identify and embody style, personality, and technique while improvising and performing set movement vocabulary.
- 4. Improve coordination, body awareness, rhythm and groove.
- 5. Demonstrate growth and development of creative, collaborative, interactive, and performance skills.
- 6. Embrace feedback and actively participate in discussions.
- 7. Experience the creative process from rehearsal to performance.

### Requirements

- 1. Arrive 5 minutes prior to the commencement of class to prepare your physical instrument
- 2. Water bottle: full every class.

Write a 500-750 word review of Ephemeral Artifacts: Travis Knights at the DJD Dance Centre. Provide a short description of the work and discuss your experience of the performance. Relate some aspects of the performance to your class experiences, incorporating dance vocabulary from the in-class discussions and experiences.

#### Final Project (15%)

Create a stylistic choreography reflecting your musical and rhythmic sensitivity and newly acquired movement versatility and creativity within the jazz dance aesthetic. A short oral presentation will also be included. Details will be discussed in class and shared via email.

### Attendance

Upon a third absence, the student may receive a failing grade for the course at the instructor's discretion.

# Communication
