Course Description

New Testament Greek 2 is a continuation of New Testament Greek 1 (GR 100) that introduces grammar, syntax and vocabulary not covered in Greek 1. Principles of translation are introduced as New Testament passages from the gospels, the Pauline epistles and I John are translated. Prerequisite: GR 100.

Course Objectives

At the conclusion of New Testament Greek 2, the student should be able to do the following:

- Translate New Testament passages, recognizing inflections and applying the syntax of the demonstratives and various pronouns, contract verbs, *mi* verbs, 3rd declension nouns, participles, infinitives, subjunctives, imperatives, optatives, conditional sentences, double accusatives and adverbs (as well as the grammar introduced in Greek 1).
- Use a minimum vocabulary of 500 words.
- Read the apparatus of the UBS Greek New Testament and apply principles of textual criticism.
- Apply basic principles of exegesis to New Testament texts translated.

Course Requirements

In order to complete this course successfully the student should do the following:

- Attend class with the translation exercise assigned for the class completed (a translation exercise is associated with each lesson of *An Introduction to New Testament Greek*). Attendance and completion of exercises will be kept track of through handing in the completed exercise at the end of class. No translation exercise will be accepted later than the end of the class it is due.
- Read each assigned lesson from *An Introduction to New Testament Greek* and memorize the paradigms and vocabulary associated with it.
- Read sections from *The Basics of New Testament Syntax: An Intermediate Greek Grammar* that expand on the grammar introduced in various lessons of *An Introduction to New Testament Greek*.
- Write two 90 minute mid-term examinations. These will test points of grammar covered to the date of the test.
- Write a final exam of 3 hours duration. This exam will test points of grammar covered during the semester.
