L Course Objectives

With successful completion of this course, the student should be able to demonstrate the following:

- A) Proper usage of grammatical, mechanical, and stylistic conventions of the English language.
- B) Competence in composing sentences, paragraphs, introductions, and conclusions, as well as essay theses and outlines.
- C) The ability to write a book review and two of the following kinds of essay writing: descriptive, narrative, persuasive, expository, and comparative.
- D) Proficiency in using the library and writing a research paper by established methods.

III. Course Requirements & Evaluation

- 40% A) Students will write <u>two</u> two-page essays (approx. 500 words each) from the five types noted under section C of the Course Objectives, plus <u>one</u> book review of comparable length.
- 15% B) Write three grammar quizzes worth 5% each.
- 20% C) Write a research paper of eight to ten pages based on library research. The final grade will be based on the final product as well as prepatory work to be handed in before the due date of the final product, such as an essay outline, thesis statement, bibliography, etc.
- 25% D) Write a final examination which tests proficiency in the grammar and mechanics of the English language, as well as different essay types.

IV. General Information

- A) Students are responsible to be aware of the academic regulations found in the college catalogue and in the <u>Student Handbook</u>, which governs this course.
- B) All papers are to be submitted at the beginning of class on the due date. Late work must be submitted to the "assignment drop-box" beside the switchboard office; the date it is received will be stamped on the assignment and it will be docked 5% of the total value per day for five days. After that time the assignment will receive a failing grade.
- C) Students registered in this course are expected to be punctual and to attend all sessions of the course. All will be required to sign a register, which records attendance.
