## III. COURSE REQUIREMENTS and EVALUATION

- a. Students will write <u>three</u> of the two-page essays (approx. 500 words) noted under Section b. of Course Objectives, plus <u>one</u> book review of comparable length (32%).
- b. Complete at least three and not more than five grammar quizzes (scheduled or unscheduled) as well as short written exercises (e.g. paragraphs) (15%).
- c. Write a research paper of eight to ten pages based on library research. The final grade for the paper will be based on the final product plus an assignment consisting of preparatory steps in writing the paper (28%).
- d. Write a final examination which tests proficiency in the grammar and mechanics of English, as well as types of essays (25%).

## IV. GENERAL INFORMATION

- a. Students are responsible to be aware of the academic regulations found in the College <u>Catalogue</u> and in the Student Handbook which govern course work..
- b. All papers are to be submitted at the beginning of the class on the due date. Late work must be submitted to the receptionist at the switchboard; it will be docked 5% of the possible total value per day for five days. After that the work will receive a failing grade.
- c. Students registered in this class are expected to be punctual and to attend all sessions of the class. All will be requested to sign a daily register which records both attendance and punctuality.
