#### **Course Description:**

This course is an introduction to the basic principles of biblical Hebrew with emphasis on morphology (words and their forms) and syntax (how words fit together to make coherent sentences). There will also be a strong emphasis on acquiring a broad vocabulary for reading the Old Testament in Hebrew. The study of Hebrew is very challenging for most students but is very rewarding for students who persevere. You should plan on spending 1-3 hours *every day* preparing for and reviewing material covered in class.

#### **Course Objectives:**

In successfully completing this course, a student should:

- know the basic forms of Hebrew words
- have memorized a solid vocabulary
- have begun to translate texts directly from the Hebrew Bible.
- know the value of knowing the original language of the Old Testament for research and exegesis and translation comparison
- have built a foundation for a lifetime of fruitful engagement with the Hebrew Scriptures
