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#### **Course Description**

The course seeks to provide students with a general survey of the history of moral philosophy and to introduce them to the contemporary and ongoing debates surrounding ethical theorizing and the practice of applied ethics.

### **Objectives**

- 1. Students should learn to appreciate the contributions of prominent historical figures in the development of the Western tradition of moral philosophy such as Plato, Aristotle, Augustine, Aquinas, Hume, Kant, Mill, Nietzsche, among others.
- 2. Students should learn to articulate the general distinctions between metaethics, normative ethics, and applied ethics.
- 3. Students should learn to articulate some of the practical and conceptual implications of various schools of ethical thought such as utilitarianism, deontology, noncognitivism, intuitionism, among others.
- 4. Students should learn to appreciate how moral philosophy engages with important areas of allied study including, but not limited to, theology, education, and political and legal philosophy.

#### **Required Readings**

The purchase of a text book will not be required for this course but there *will be* required readings throughout the term and these will be made available either through library reserve or by the instructor.

#### COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND EVALUATION

1. Attendance and participation

20%

- Students are expected to attend each class session with an engaged frame of mind, prepared to contribute meaningful conversation to the topics under discussion. Each absence from class merits an immediate 1% deduction and class participation is assessed on the balance. For example, if a student misses three classes and generally participates excellently in class he or she generally cannot achieve more than 17/20 for this portion of his or her evaluation.
- 2. Seminar Presentation on an "Applied topic"

15%

- Choose one of the six applied topics and prepare a seminar that presents a reasoned position on the issue at hand. Seminars leaders are free to argue for a particular position but objections reflecting the strongest arguments from the opposing view must be addressed.
- 3. Six Page "Moral Issue" Research Paper

25%

- Due December 2<sup>nd</sup>
- This includes a short abstract identifying the topic and the general line of argumentation. Abstracts must be submitted via e-mail no later than Friday, November 12<sup>th</sup> by 4:00 PM..
- 4. Final exam : Date TBA

40%

Students must pass the final exam to ensure a passing grade in the course. A student who performs well during the term but performs very poorly on the final exam may fail the course.

### RESEARCH PAPERS SUBMISSION PROCEDURE

- Each paper is to be submitted electronically as an e-mail attachment by 4:00 PM on the assigned due date. No hard copy submission is not required. E-mails will be saved as 'official submissions' in the event of dispute over original content.
- Required word processing formats are either @Microsoft Word or @Word Perfect (i.e., .doc or .wpd files). Files are to be named as follows: (last name)(first initial)(PH202).doc or (last name)(first initial)(PH202).wpd.

#### LATE POLICY

- Late submissions (i.e., submissions after 4:00 PM on the due date) lose 5% for every 24 hours they are not submitted. Weekend days and holidays are counted the same as typical weekdays. Submissions more than 5 days (120 hours) late receive a failing grade.
- Papers and grades will be returned electronically to each student's auc-nuc e-mail address.

### RESEARCH PAPER FORMAT REQUIREMENTS

- Roughly 23 lines of text per page
- Double spaced (not e.g., 1.25, 1.95, 2.5, etc.)
- 12pt Font (not e.g., 10, 11, 11.8, 12.5, etc.)
- New paragraphs should be indented with no additional space between paragraphs.
- Sentences should be separated by two spaces, not just one.
- 1 inch (or 2.5 cm) margins.
