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COURSE DESCRIPTION


This course provides students with a general survey of the history of moral philosophy. As well, it introduces them to the important debates in moral theorizing and to the practice of applied ethics.

OBJECTIVES

- 1. Students should learn to appreciate the contributions of prominent historical figures in the development of the Western tradition of moral philosophy such as Plato, Aristotle, Augustine, Aquinas, Hume, Kant, Mill, Nietzsche, among others.
- 2. Students should learn to articulate the general distinctions between metaethics, normative ethics, and applied ethics.
- 3. Students should learn to articulate some of the practical and conceptual implications of various schools of ethical thought such as utilitarianism, deontology, noncognitivism, intuitionism, among others.
- 4. Students should learn to appreciate how moral philosophy engages with important areas of allied study including, but not limited to, theology, education, and political and legal philosophy.

- Submission Procedure:
- Assignments are to be submitted as e-mail attachments. Printed copies are not required.
- Format Requirements:
- Required word processing format is ®Microsoft Word. Attachments are to be named as follows: PH 202 last name, first initial
- E.g., PH 202 Jones A.doc
- Double spaced (not e.g., 1.25, 1.95, 2.5, etc.)
- Roughly 1 to 1.25 inch margins (2.5 to 3.0 cm).

- 12pt Font (not e.g., 11, 11.8, 12.5, etc.) of New Times Roman or equivalent (<u>not</u> Arial, etc.)
- New paragraphs should be indented with no additional separation between paragraphs.
- Sentences should be separated by two spaces, not just one.
- Papers must have a title page.
- Eight (8) pages of roughly 23 lines of text per page: 178—184 total lines of text. Footnotes do not count as text.
- Text pages must be numbered; title pages should not be numbered.
- Citation procedure must be consistent, efficient, and accurately facilitate the confirmation of research sources. Failure to cite sources accurately is a form of academic dishonesty.
- Failure to comply with any of the format requirements may result in a minimum of a 3-5% reduction in paper grade: e.g., a *C*+ paper will reduce to a *C* or *C*-.
- <u>Late Policy</u>: Late submissions (i.e., submissions after 4:00 PM on December 8th) are penalized 5% for every 24 hours they are not submitted. Submissions more than 5 days (120 hours) late receive a failing grade.
- Extensions: Extensions are granted very infrequently and only for very good reasons. (E.g., computer or other technological failures are not considered good reasons. Be sure to keep back up copies that enable you to write from various locations.) Extension requests must be made not less than 48 hours prior to the submission deadline.

4. Final Examination:

- Students must pass the final exam to ensure a passing grade in the course. A student who performs well during the term but performs very poorly on the final exam may fail the course.
