Course Description

The course will be an introduction to the philosophy of law with particular attention to jurisprudence—the area of philosophy of law that seeks to classify the concept of law in relation to other action-guiding and sanction-imposing systems, most notably morality. The course will also examine the philosophical foundations of various streams of law including, criminal law, tort law, property law, and constitutional law.

Course Objectives

- 1. Students should learn the classic and contemporary perspectives on the core issues of natural law theory, legal positivism, and legal realism.
- 2. Students should become conversant with some of the land mark judicial rulings and philosophical analyses that shape our thinking about topics including, but not limited to, freedom of expression, same sex marriage, equality, minority rights, religious freedom, judicial review, etc.
- 3. Students should appreciate the rich complex relationship that exists between metaphysics, moral philosophy, political philosophy, and both the practice and the philosophy of law.
