Course Description

The course introduces students to the origins of Philosophy in the Greco-Roman tradition. We begin with various insights and disputes among the Presocratics, and also contributions of the Sophists, leading up to the classical era of Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle. Out of the classical era various movements and developments are considered, including Stoicism/Cynicism, Epicureanism, and Scepticism. The Neo-Platonists bring the Ancient era to a close.

Expected Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students should learn how Philosophy in the Western tradition departs from the folk-mythological traditions and methodologies of Homeric/Archaic Greece.
- 2. Students should learn the profoundly prescient and enduring scientific, metaphysical, epistemological, and ethical contributions made by ancient thinkers in the Greco-Roman tradition.
- 3. Students should come to appreciate the important ways in which Ancient Philosophy shaped theology, theological controversies, and the development of Christian civilization down through the Middle Ages and into the Modern Era.

Requirements:

1. Attendance & Participation

10%

- Please make every effort to be seated and prepared for class by 9:45. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of most, if not all classes. Students are expected to attend each class session with an engaged frame of mind. Students should be prepared to contribute thoughtful conversation to the topics under discussion. Under most circumstances absence from class results in a deduction of 1 mark. Three lates/early departures results in a deduction of 1 mark.
- ➤ Class participation is assessed on the balance. Students whose attendance is perfect but who are otherwise minimally engaged with lecture material should anticipate nothing better than C+ (7/10) for this portion of their grade. Students may enhance their participation grade by contributing discussion and analysis to online discussion forums found weekly on Moodle.
- > Students physically in class but otherwise engaged in non-class activities (e.g., sleeping, texting, chatting, reading) are simply in the same room and may be assessed as absent. This will also negatively influence participation evaluation. Students who regularly arrive late, leave in the middle, or depart early may be marked as absent.
- ➤ Twelve absences immediately results in a failing grade for the course. Upon your twelfth absence you will be copied on an e-mail sent to the Registrar's office. The 'F' will be posted immediately on the student portal.

Students wishing to withdraw from a course, but who fail to do so by the applicable date, will receive the grade earned in accordance with the course syllabus. A student obliged to withdraw from a course after the Withdrawal Deadline because of health or other reasons may apply to the Registrar for special consideration.

Exam Scheduling

Students, who find a conflict in their exam schedule must submit a Revised Examination Request form to the Registrar's Office by the deadline date; please consult the List of Important Dates. Requests will be considered for the following reasons only: 1) the scheduled final examination slot conflicts with another exam; 2) the student has three final exams within three consecutive exam time blocks; 3) the scheduled final exam slot conflicts with an exam at another institution; 4) extenuating circumstances. Travel is not considered a valid excuse for re-scheduling or missing a final exam.

Electronic Etiquette

Course extensions are only granted for serious issues that arise "due to circumstances beyond the student's control."

Appeal of Grade

An appeal for change of grade on any course work must be made to the course instructor within one week of receiving notification of the grade. An appeal for change of final grade must be submitted to the Registrar's Office in writing and providing the basis for appeal within 30 days of receiving notification of the final grade, providing the basis for appeal. A review fee of \$50.00 must accompany the appeal. If the appeal is sustained, the fee will be refunded.
