Course Description:

This course explores the integration of significant ecologies in which children and families develop and the interactions that take place within and between these contexts. In particular, the socialization influences of the family, the school, the peer group, mass media, the church, and the community will be explored. The focus will be on understanding these sources of socialization and what we can do to foster healthy development in children and families.

Course Objectives:

At the end of this course, you should be able to:

- Articulate the nature and roles of the ecologies of the child, family, school, peer group, mass media, and community;
- Understand the aims, agents, and methods of socialization;
- Identify the linkages among the various ecologies and their role in risk and resilience; and
- Understand implicit and explicit socialization outcomes specific to children and families.

Course Requirements:

1) **Mid-Term Exam (20%)**

The exam will cover chapters 1-6 and include multiple choice and short and long answer questions. This exam will be on **October 24** and will be 75 minutes in length.

2) Assessing Ecologies of Socialization (30%)

You will choose <u>one</u> of the agents of socialization – family, parents, school, child care, peers, media, community (including church) – and assess its effectiveness via the aims and methods of socialization as evidenced within both the empirical literature and in local/national programs (including CCSD reports). This paper will be 8-10 pages in length (double-spaced, APA style, 12-point font) and will be due on **November 5, 2001**. More on this assignment to follow.

3) Assessing Outcomes of Socialization (20%)

You will choose <u>one</u> of the outcomes of socialization – values, morals, attitudes, gender roles, self-esteem, etc. – and critically evaluate the role of one (or two max.) of the ecologies in the development of both positive <u>and</u> negative outcomes related to this outcome (including CCSD reports). You will present the results of your research in a 15-minute oral presentation during class on either **November 30** or **December 7**. More on this assignment to follow.

4) Final Exam (30%)

The exam will focus mainly on chapters 7-12 and include multiple choice and short and long answer questions. Some cumulative material (from chapters 1-6) will also be included on the final exam. This will be a two-hour exam during the **Exam Period**.

Course Guidelines:

- 1) Attendance at class is expected from each student. After three (3) unexcused absences (per term), the instructor reserves the right to ask a student to withdraw from the class.
- 2) The written assignments are due on the dates specified. Extensions will only be granted upon request of the student at least two (2) weeks prior to the due date. In the case of illness or other extenuating circumstances, exceptions will be made.
- 3) Exams must be taken at the times specified. The student must inform the instructor immediately if there is a problem with taking a test on a certain date.
- 4) All written work must adhere to the attached *Minimum Standards of Correctness*.
