Course Description

The course gives consideration to the classical practice of spiritual direction in various Christian traditions from ancient to modern times and the influence of outstanding spiritual mentors of the 20^{th} century.

Course Objectives

- To expose the student to Christian concepts of spiritual direction / companionship from various time periods and traditions;
- To give in depth attention to the practice and dynamics of spiritual direction / companionship in a contemporary setting;
- To offer practical guidance in the seeking out of a relationship of spiritual direction / companionship;
- To reflect on the emphases of some significant spiritual mentors in the 20th century.

Course Requirements and Grading

- A. A review / response paper (6-8 pages) on Margaret Guenther, Holy Listening which responds to the following questions:
 - 1. What is Guenther's understanding of 'spiritual direction'? (10 marks)
 - 2. What are your areas of agreement / disagreement with Guenther's concept of spiritual direction? (10 marks)
 - 3. What issues were raised for you by the book? Think within and 'beyond the book'. (6 marks)
 - 4. What do you want to study further as a result of reading the book (4 marks).

- B. **A review / response paper (6-8 pages)** on Kyriacos Markides, <u>The Mountain of Silence</u> which responds to the following questions:
 - 1. Based on your reading of the book, construct a working definition of the practice of spiritual direction (be as succinct and precise as possible!) (4 marks)
 - 2. Identify the major distinguishing features of the spirituality of Father Maximos. What issues does it raise for you? (10 marks)
 - 3. How would you characterize the 'style' of Father Maximos in his practice of spiritual direction? Give specific references. (8 marks)
 - 4. How does the kind of spiritual direction described in the book fit with your 'experience' of Christianity? (5 marks)
 - 5. What is your overall evaluation of the book? (3 marks)

Important Notes:

- 1. The Registration Revision Period is September 8-17/2010. The last day to enter courses without permission and to withdraw from courses and receive tuition refund is September 17/2010;
- 2. The last day to apply for time extension for course work is November 29/2010;
- 3. Lectures will not always cover all the text material. Readings from the text provide the context for the lecture.
- 4. All late assignments which have not received an officially approved extension will be granted the highest possible failing grade. Extensions will be considered only in cases such as a death in the family, the hospitalization of yourself or a member of your immediate family, or a prolonged illness for which you required treatment by a physician. All requests for extensions must be received in writing at least seven days prior to the due date. Factors such as assignments for other courses, computer software difficulties, or computer printer malfunctions are not sufficient grounds for requesting an extension. If an extension has been granted it is your responsibility when submitting the paper to attach a note indicating the date to which the extension was granted and the date on which the paper is actually submitted. Retain for yourself a copy (software or hard copy) of each paper.
- 5. The title page of <u>ALL</u> assignments should include the course name and number, the professor's name, the student's name, student ID number and mailbox number. This is imperative!
- 6. All assignments must be turned in by the last day of classes in order to receive credit for the course. In the event that all work has not been turned in by the end of the course, and a 'time extension' has not been approved by November 29/2010, a failing grade will be received for the course.
- 7. No assignments will be received by electronic transmission.
- 8. Minimum standards of writing will be observed in all typed essay assignments.
- 9. Final grades will be available on the student portals. Printed grades will no longer be mailed out.
- 10. Students are responsible to check their Ambrose e-mail accounts regularly. Emails may be used to notify students of cancelled classes or other important details relating to the course.
