1. Course Description

Diaspora Missiology is fast emerging discipline in Missiology. This course will examine the biblical and theological foundation and its missiological framework (i.e. perspective, paradigm, ministry pattern, and ministry style). Local congregations must be aware 21st Century realities (e.g. mass migration) and position their ministries in the context of our "borderless world." 100 years ago the church did missions by going, sending, and coming" but in our age of global migrations and high speed mobility in technology and travel, missions is now conducted from "everywhere to everywhere!"

2. Course Objectives

2.1. Cognitive

- To engage in the interdisciplinary study of who, where, how, when and why of the phenomenon of diaspora.
- To examine the biblical, theological, ecclesiological, and missiological framework of the diaspora missiology.

2.2 . Affective

- To develop a theological framework for diaspora missiology.
- To examine the challenges of "people on the move" and learn creative ways through which to develop authentic relationship with these diasporas who have come to our country (i.e. city, community and neighborhood).

4. Course Outline and Presentation

This course will be facilitated by a lead-instructor but will be complemented by several practitioners from various ethnic communities (e.g. pastors of diaspora congregations; urban diaspora evangelists and church-planters; advocacy workers among refugees, asylum seekers, etc.) presenting their ministry model as a case study of diaspora missiology in action. Hence, this course will be academically and practically complementary.

5. Course Requirements

The purpose of the course requirements is to enable the learner delve deeper into a particular diaspora group of interest and to help them develop resources for their specific ministry application.

1. Participation (10%)

• Full class attendance and active participation is required for course credit.

2. Reading and Reaction Paper Assignment (20%)

- The learners will write four (2 pages) reaction papers.
- Each reaction paper will be worth 5%.
- Due at the beginning of AM class from February 22-25

3. Annotated Bibliography (20%)

- Compile an annotated bibliography of a Canadian Diaspora group of at least 25 items (thesis & dissertations only).
- Due Date March 26th

4. Sermon Outlines on Diaspora (10%)

- Each student will prepare issue-based sermon outlines related to the readings.
- Due Date March 26th

5. Interaction Reflection Project (10%)

- Select a first-generation Diaspora family (preferably from outside Canada and the USA) from your neighborhood, workplace, network of friends, etc. and interact with them (on at least 4 occasions) with a possibility of implicit or explicit Christian witness.
- Document each "interaction" in a written reflection (2-3 pages), including comments and interactions from your readings. This may include your struggles, questions, successes, etc. on your Christian witness.
- Record what each "interaction" means for you. Use this to process what you have learned from
 class and what you are learning from your interaction. Your reflections will help you develop
 your intercultural ministry skills.
- Due Date: May 12th

6. Sermon Manuscripts and Presentation (30%)

- Applying what you learned from the class—the theoretical, biblical, theological, methodological, and missiological principles— and using the previously submitted sermon outlines (see section 5.4), prepare five sermon manuscripts. The manuscripts should be written in keeping with the Ambrose University College and Seminary Style sheet for research documentation. One sermon must be preached before May 19th. An evaluation form will be provided for an observing ministry leader and must be submitted for credit.
