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A. Description

This course introduces the basic concepts in missiology by . . .

- . . . exploring foundational themes in Old and New Testament theology of missions;
- . . . considering the rise and development of missionary movements from apostolic times to the present;
- . . . investigating issues arising from applied anthropology relating to cross-cultural communications; and
- . . . identifying important trends and selected strategies being used in contemporary world missions.

B. Objectives

The course is designed to . . .

- . . . explain the theological & biblical principles which provide the theoretical basis for Christian mission;
- . . . provide some understanding of the historical factors which have influenced the development of Christian missions in various regions of the world;
- . . . help participants discover how applied anthropology intersects with the goals and mandate of Christian mission;
- . . . provide understanding of the strategic process and dynamics of missiology, recognizing the complexities involved in the cross-cultural communication of the gospel.

E. Structure

The class is structured to help in the understanding of what mission is in a variety of cumulative ways:

1. Speakers have been provided who come with experience, insights, and expertise in the areas discussed in this course. Their presentations will buttress the main principles described in the excellent text Reader.
2. A variety of videos may be used to bring a visual dimension to the Mission’s introduction as well.
3. Drama and role-play may be incorporated to help illustrate principles being taught.
5. A comprehensive research project will help you apply principles taught throughout the courses.
6. Weekly efforts will be made to ‘connect’ us with God’s intentions for us and His world.

F. Expectations and Outcomes

1. Participation

The learner is expected to attend all the sessions. The Perspective course is an integrated learning experience:

- The material is developed in an inter-connected way with following lessons building on previous ones.
- The class content will develop and give a further dimension to the reading.
- Most classes will incorporate some measure of review.
- The speakers come with a great deal of 1st hand experience and will be a challenge to your growth.

2. “Quizzes” (25%) Due before the relevant lecture. (See section “D” above.)

- *Readings*: Each class presentation is given to reinforce principles presenting in the Textbook. Your *Perspective...Workbook* will provide supplementary instruction & direction on required reading in the *Perspectives...Reader*. The Workbook dialogue and the readings will conclude with a reading review [“Quiz”]. Because of the condensed format of this class, the readings up to the Certificate level, as indicated in the *Workbook*, must be completed in accordance with week module format.
- *Completion of Each Quiz*: Complete the quiz accurately but succinctly in point form.
- At the start of each class, your “tear-out” quizzes need to be handed in. These papers will be returned with review information. (Internet quiz blanks: <http://www.perspectives.org/students/resources.html>)

3. Applied Assignment – (10%)

The course gives the choice between 2 applied assignments. Choose ONE (1).

a. Temple Tour

Attend at least two different Temples/Mosques representing two or more of the major world religions in your own community. Write a three (3) page reflective summary of the sites toured, correlating observations and impressions with the basic core belief structures. (i.e. How does the worldview represented in the religion demonstrate itself in temple worship and in you observations of the lives of those who worship there.)

OR

b. International Worker (Missionary) Interview

Interview a international worker (missionary)* who has had more than 10 years of cross-cultural missionary experience, pursuing the question of what makes an effective international worker (missionary). Present your findings in a paper of 5 pages in length. (*You would be well advised to work with a international worker who has worked at understanding another culture and learned a language in a direct ministry with the people of his/her area.)

4. Research Paper – (25%)

The class will require a major research paper developing a strategy to establish churches amongst an unreached group of people of your choice. This should be verified with the Coordinator prior to major research. Details of this assignment will be handed out near the middle of the course. It will require careful research, creativity, and developing some format skill. Guiding questions & resources will be distributed. This project may be completed in teams – please consult with the Coordinator prior to commencing.

5. Examination – (35%)

- A **Mid-Term Exam** (15%) will occur halfway through the course and is work
- A **Comprehensive Take-home Final** (20%) examination will be based on the required readings (primarily) and the lectures/activities. This examination must be proctored according to the instructions included with it.

6. Personal Responses – (5%)

- Five reflective summaries are required at the conclusion of each section of the course. Rather than being an academic exercise, they are to be a reflective integration of the personal impact of the material.
- **Due at the end of the relevant section.** (See “D” above)
