WELCOME TO AMBROSE UNIVERSITY



Compliance with the Canadian Immigration Law

It is student's responsibility to ensure that their immigration and legal documents, such as passport, study permit and co-op work permit (for students in the work-integrated programs) are current and maintained. DO NOT LET YOUR DOCUMENTS EXPIRE! Your study permit's validity must cover your entire duration of study, including at least 30 extra days after the end of your last courses while you wait for the final grades to be posted in the system and for your student file to be audited for graduation. If your study permit's expiry date does not cover your estimated duration of study, you must apply to IRCC to extend your study permit about 4 months prior to its expiry date. For guidelines on the study permit extension process, please review our Study Permit Extension via IRCC web.

Changing DLI

Please visit the IRCC page about changing school or program. If you studied at some other DLI in Canada and then transitioned to Ambrose, you must let IRCC know about it.

Housing and Accommodation

We highly recommend all first year students to live in Residence. Living on campus provides you with the freedom you will need to explore Calgary, We believe it is your best option for a smooth and supportive transition into university life and to experience all that the Ambrose community has to offer. Studies show that living in residence has a positive impact on student satisfaction and degree completion, plus who can beat the commute? Here are the options:

Single occupancy room \$5200 for the school year, \$2600 per semester

Double occupancy room \$4200 for the school year, \$2100 per semester;

TIP: The rental owner will ask for references

Be prepared to give references, provide bank statements, or even pay 3 months in advance.

TIP: Beware of Rental Scams

- 1. The rental property does not exist
- 2. The property does exist. However, the rental property offered does not belong to the fraudster

TIP: Keep your cash close

Scammers will always ask for money up front, like a security deposit or first and last month's rent. If you are not sure where it is going, or whether it is the official property owner, do not send it. Money sent via wire service or etransfers will be as good as gone. Whenever possible, try to make payments with credit card.



Alberta Health

Getting your Alberta Health card is extremely important. You and your dependents should apply for the Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan (AHCIP) coverage as soon as you can, if you plan to remain in Alberta for 12 months or more.



To apply for AHCIP Coverage:

1. Fill out the application form or download it from the Alberta Government website by scanning the QR code:

2. Gather supporting documents:

i) Passport

ii) Canada entry document (study or work permit)



iii) Proof of Alberta residency, which can be either a print-out & stamped form from your bank where you have opened an account or a utility bill. These documents must contain your full name, address and have a date of less than 90 days to ensure the information is reasonably current.

3. Bring the completed application form and your original documents to an authorized registry in your area. There is no charge for this service. Processing time can take up to 5 days. Cards are mailed from the AHCIP office.

The registry location nearest to Ambrose is: Richmond Road Registry 5767 Signal Hill Centre Southwest

In addition, all full-time (3 or more courses) Ambrose students are automatically enrolled in the Health and Dental plan offered by the Ambrose Student Council, which provides additional coverage of expenses not covered by the Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan. Applying for Social Insurance Number

As an international student, it is strongly recommended to apply for a Social Insurance Number (SIN). With the SIN number you will be able to work, file tax returns or to receive benefits and services from government programs.

You could apply online, by mail, or in person. There are 3 locations in Calgary where you can apply in person.

- Harry Hays Building, Suite 150 (220 4th Ave. SE)
- Royal Vista Service (15 Royal Vista Place NW, Floor 3, Suite 350)

PLEASE NOTE: A SIN is issued to one person only and it cannot legally be used by anyone else. **Please protect your SIN** – do not disclose this number to anyone except Ambrose, the government authorities or employers when officially required. Store any document containing your SIN and personal information in a safe place.

Alberta ID Card

If you are an Alberta resident and do not have a valid driver's license, you can apply for an ID card through any authorized registry agent. You would not want to carry your passport around, so the ID card can replace it. You will need to provide a utility bill, bank statement, or credit card statement in order to prove that you are an Alberta resident. The document may be presented in paper or electronically.





Driver's License

You can continue using your license from your home country if you already have one. However, the offer remains for a year only. On the completion of one year, you must get your Alberta license.

You have the option to exchange your license, but you must surrender your valid territorial driver's license to a registry agent. You can check if your country has signed a Reciprocal Licensing Agreement with Alberta. If your country is not part of the agreement, you would have to complete a Driving Knowledge Test, Vision Screening, and Advanced Road Test.



All new drivers will have to go through a two-stage process to become a fully licensed driver. It takes a minimum of 2 years to complete both stages of the graduated driver's licensing system in Alberta. You would get a learner's license first, upon completion of your knowledge test, and a year later, you would be able to take the Road Test. The 2-years waiting time does not pertain to those who held driving license in their home country. You can register for a knowledge test online from your area's registry website. To prepare for the test, download and review the Government of Alberta's "Driver's Guide to Operation, Safety and Licensing". The guide may also be available in other languages as well.

LOCAL CLIMATE IN CALGARY

Calgary is a mountain-high city, and the climate is dry. The sun shines an average of 2,300 hours every year, making Calgary the sunniest major city in Canada. During the winter you will need the following clothing items – a warm winter jacket, gloves, boots and a toque (knitted hat). Calgary weather is unpredictable – 'Chinook' winds, a warm, moist wind from the Pacific Ocean can raise the temperature by as much as 15 degrees in a few hours. One moment you might be wearing your winter attire, the next, shorts and a t-shirt.


It is very important to wear layers! It can be cold in the morning, warm in the afternoon and cold at night, so having many different layers is really important.

Airport Transportation



Public Transit • Cost \$8 • 30 minutes to downtown Calgary

There are two public transit routes linking the Calgary International Airport with the city. Route 300 Airport-City Centre is an express bus service that connects the airport with the downtown core. The service is available every 30 minutes from 5 a.m. until midnight every day. Customers boarding at the airport need to purchase an \$8 Calgary Transit Boarding Pass from the Mac's store in the airport. Route 100 Airport-McKnight Station links Calgary International Airport with the McKnight Westwinds CTrain Station in the northeast. The CTrain connects with the downtown core, south and northwest Calgary. The route operates every 20 to 30 minutes on weekdays and every 30 minutes on weekends. Both routes can be found on the arrivals level one, near gate C.

Taxi • Cost Approx. \$45 • 25 minutes to downtown Calgary

Cab fares to and from Calgary International Airport depend on the distance of your destination, but a one way trip to and from the airport from the downtown core is generally between \$40 to \$45. On-demand airport service is provided by Associated Cabs, which offers wheelchair accessible cars.

Uber • Cost Approx. \$35 • 30 minutes to downtown Calgary Shuttle • Cost \$15 • 30 minutes to downtown Calgary

The Calgary Allied Airport Shuttle runs every 30 minutes, seven days a week, from 8 a.m. until midnight. Tickets are \$15 one-way and can be purchased online or by calling 403-299-9555. Catch the shuttle at Bus Bay 8 on arrivals level one. It connects Calgary International Airport with most major hotels in the downtown core. Some hotels also offer their own shuttle to and from the airport.

Ambrose is conveniently located on the C-Train line. The city of Calgary has a reliable public transit system to meet the needs of commuters on a daily basis.

Low Income Transit Pass

This program provides lower cost monthly passes for adults (18 and older), youth (7-17 years of age), and an annual pass for seniors (65+). You can also get a fare that meets your family's needs. Calgary Transit will examine your total household income. This income includes the total income of all family members 18 years and older living in the same home that are related by blood, marriage, common-law or adoption

NEW STUDENT ORIENTATION



LIBRARY

ACCESSIBILITY

The Accessibility office supports students who face barriers to learning because of diagnosed medical conditions. HEALTH MATTERS

In Alberta, doctor's visits and prescriptions are covered under AHCIP and ASC Health and Dental Plan. Ambrose international students should receive insurance coverage through the provincial Alberta Health Care Insurance Plan (AHCIP) AND the ASC Health and Dental Plan at Ambrose University.

The ASC Health & Dental plan includes coverage for a wide range of medical care, including 70%–100% coverage for prescription medication, and dental care, ambulance coverage, massage therapy, physiotherapy, chiropractor and other paramedical service benefits, which are essential to your everyday wellbeing!

If you need health advice, have a health concern and need help to assess whether or not it is a medical emergency, call the Health Link by dialing 811 for quick advice from a registered nurse 24/7. They will ask questions, assess symptoms and determine the best care for you. For emergencies call 911 or call Uber to drop you off at the emergency room.

Student Health Plan

As a student at Ambrose University, Health and Dental Insurance Coverage are mandatory for all eligible students. Opt-outs are available for those who qualify. Counselling

Ambrose provides counsellors on-site or on-line to help you navigate a wide range of concerns that impact your academic performance and your overall well-being. This short term, solution focused counselling may include relationship concerns, stress, loneliness, depression, anxiety or addictions.

Counselling Services begin after classes start for each semester. Sessions are booked two weeks apart and maximum of two sessions can be booked at a time.

- Students must be registered for classes during the semester they are accessing counselling
- 5 free counselling sessions/student/academic year
- \$50/session after the first 5 dependent on treatment plan and availability
- No-show charges of \$75 will apply for sessions cancelled/rescheduled within 24 hours of the appointment time.



CULTURAL ADAPTATION

It is expected that in addition to the transition to university life, some international students will go through a process of acculturation stress (commonly known as culture shock). There may be many aspects to Canadian life, such as climate, relationships, food and the education system that are unfamiliar and difficult to understand. Some things you may experience acculturation stress about are:

- Weather
- Food
- Communities
- Classroom
- University regulations

Some signs that you may be experiencing acculturation stress are:

- Loss of appetite or overeating
- Inability to sleep or sleeping too much
- Tiredness and irritability
- Feeling alone and Isolated
- Substance abuse
- Feeling powerless

Here are some ideas on how to deal with acculturation stress:


- Know that your reactions are normal and be patient; acculturation stress may not disappear within a few days, but it will pass.
- Get to know the people who work in Student Life areas and speak with them about your experiences. Some of these areas include Student Wellness support, Counselling, and the Peer Health Team.
- Try to attend activities organized for international students. The International Student Services has organized Together Tuesday, a weekly event every Tuesday from 12:00pm-1:00pm. Join the Global Cub activities as well.
- Stay in contact with family and friends back home, using WhatsApp, Instagram, or any other online platforms.
- Keep your habits from home. If you attend places of worship, find them around your area. If you observe holidays in your home country, celebrate them here.
- If miss the food from back home, try to make them at home or order from a restaurant. There are also groceries stores from different places around the city.
- Become involved with sports or establish a routine of daily exercise. The fitness centre is free!
- Learn as much about your new environment and Canadian culture as you can.

SOME THINGS TO NOTE

SOME THINGS TO BE AWARE OF

Beware of Scams



There's a possibility you may be contacted by fraudsters posing as police officers or other government bodies attempting to obtain money from you. They may contact you in a variety of ways including over the phone, e-mail, text, or social media. These individuals may also speak your language and their calls may appear to come from legitimate police or government phone numbers.

It is important for you to know government bodies such as Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada, Canada Revenue Agency (CRA), the Calgary Police Service, the Royal Canadian Mounted Polic (RCMP) and other police agencies:

DO NOT threaten deportation or arrests of family members for non-payment, **DO NOT** demand immediate payment of taxes or fines over the phone via e-mail or through social media; and **DO NOT** accept BitCoin, gift cards, e-mail or money transfer as a valid form of payment.

DO NOT provide any personal or banking information by phone, email, text, or social media. Providing this information to fraudsters could result in the loss of money and/or identity theft.

Identity Theft

Personal information can be misused for criminal purposes. Identity thieves generally target emails, SIN cards, passports, driver's license and other IDs, accounts, and passwords.

DO NOT provide any personal or banking information by phone, email, text or social media. You are responsible for protecting your SIN – do not disclose this number to anyone except the government authorities or employers when officially required. Store any document and personal information in a safe place.



IN CANADA, INCOME TAX IS ADMINISTERED BY THE CANADA REVENUE AGENCY (CRA). IF YOU OWE INCOME TAX, YOU MUST PAY IT BY APRIL 30 FOR THE PREVIOUS CALENDAR YEAR. LATE SUBMISSIONS ARE ACCEPTED, BUT THERE MAY BE A PENALTY.

THE TAX FORMS LISTED ON THIS PAGE ARE ISSUED BY AMBROSE UNIVERSITY IN APRIL. AT THAT TIME, YOU WILL RECEIVE YOUR TAX FORMS IN THE MAIL.

T4A

If you have received a bursary, scholarship, or award, then you will be issued a T4A. The amount on your T4A shows the total funding you received in the tax year, which may not equal the total you received for the academic year.

T2202A

The T22O2 tax certificate is issued to students registered in eligible courses and programs used for filing income taxes. The certificate contains the amount of eligible tuition and/or fees paid for the tax year and the number of months a student was registered (full-time/part-time).

Filing Taxes in Canada

What you need to file a tax return:

- A Social Insurance Number (SIN)
- T22O2
- T4
- T4A

How to file you taxes:

- Online
 - You might be able to file your income tax directly to the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) online through the electronic tax-filing software NETFILE. Scan the QR code for more information.
- By Paper
 - If you are submitting your tax return by paper, find the forms you need by scanning the QR code

- Mailing your tax return
 - Check the Canadian government website for where you can submit your taxes by mail.

Apply for tax deductions

You may be eligible to deduct certain expenses from your tax payments. Moving expenses such as transportation and storage of personal effects, travel, and temporary accommodation may be considered eligible deductions. Save your receipts for the cost of relocating to Canada. However, you cannot deduct moving expenses if your income at the new location is scholarship, fellowship, or bursary income that is entirely exempt from tax under the current legislation. You may also deduct childcare expenses, Registered Retirement Saving Plan (RRSP) contributions, and union dues.
