## **Course Description**

This course provides an introduction to the genres of popular fiction: fantasy, romance, detective, thriller, didactic, science fiction, and others. By attending to the differences between these genres, as well as to the distinctions that may be drawn between popular and literary fiction, students will both explore how popular authors treat such universal themes as love, justice, and mortality, and gain insight into what is meant when a text is called 'good.'

## **Expected Learning Outcomes**

Students will:

- read a variety of texts emblematic of the popular fiction genres detective, science fiction, science fantasy, western, and horror
- practice close-reading in order to elucidate the intentions of a given author
- identify and describe the conventions associated with the popular fiction genres listed above
- explore the differences between what is referred to as "literary" and popular fiction
- further develop the skills required for academic writing

## **Requirements**:

20% Reading Responses (10 @ 2% each)

Students must submit ten Reading Responses in EN 270, each worth 2% of their final grade. A Reading Response is a 190-210-word answer to a specific question. The questions to which students will respond and the dates upon which responses may be submitted are on the Reading Responses handout.

# 15% In-Class Essay

Students will write an in-class essay on January 29th in response to a specific question about the relationship between Chandler's The Big Sleep and Hawks's 1946 film of the same name.

There will be an extra-curricular viewing of Hawks's film on the evening of either January 22nd or 23rd. Students who can't attend this viewing should ensure that they see the film before January 24th, on which date we'll discuss it in class. (It is very likely our discussion will generate the in-class essay question to which students will respond.)

Hawks's The Big Sleep will be on reserve in the Ambrose library (as will be the Coen Brothers' True Grit and Wise's The Haunting).

## 35% Essay

Students will write an essay (2000-2500 words) in which they discuss either Jemisin's The Fifth Season (due March 6th) or Portis's True Grit (due March 20th).

## 20% Final Exam

Students will write a final exam (date TBA). Half of this exam will deal specifically with Jackson's The Haunting of Hill House and possibly Wise's 1953 film of the same name.

### Communication

### Registration
