Course Description

This course is designed as an introduction to Canadian fiction in English from 1925 to the present. Students will be encouraged to explore a wide variety of Canadian writers and subjects. The discussions will contextualize Canadian writing in relation to major literary movements and events within and outside of Canada.

Course Objectives

- 1. This course will introduce students to specifically Canadian literary works in prose of the last seventy-five years. Canadian context and culture will be foregrounded.
- 2. This course will give students the opportunity to respond in writing to the rich Canadian literature read in class.
- 3. This course will further students' critical reading and writing abilities, while engaging with ideas that are close to home and exotic at the same time.
