### **Course Description**

This course embraces the periods of Restoration, the Augustan Age, and the Age of Sensibility in Britain. Beginning with Milton, and proceeding to other canonical figures such as Pope, Swift, Dryden, and Johnson, the course also investigates several lesser-known and women writers of the period.

#### **Course Objectives**

- 1. This course will further the students' knowledge of the neoclassical writers, some of which were introduced in EN 220.
- 2. This course will give students a thorough understanding of Neoclassicism and its canonical and non-canonical authors.
