Course Objectives

English 330 presents a thorough survey of the various kinds of English poetry, with examples from the fourteenth to the twentieth century. This course develops the basic principles of formal poetic analysis through close readings of poems at the same time that it presents an analysis of the nature of poetry in its various traditions and uses of language.
