#### **Course Description**

In many ways, the Victorian era in Britain (1837-1901) defined not only the modern novel, but also our contemporary ideas about the individual, political economy, psychology, gender, faith, creativity, science, and art. By studying a representative group of Victorian novels this course offers students a foundation in one of the most definitive of all literary epochs, and it provides students with an opportunity to examine many of the nineteenth-century ideas and attitudes that shaped our contemporary literary and cultural landscape.

## **Course Objectives**

- 1. To examine in detail six key Victorian novels;
- 2. To study and comprehend the cultural and historical elements that defined Victorian Britain;
- 3. To trace the continuities between nineteenth-century Britain and our current cultural context;
- 4. To develop the ability of students to read closely, analytically, and to write more effectively and clearly.
