Course Description

Wordsworth's and Coleridge's *Lyrical Ballads* (1798) began the Romantic period in English literature, a period that witnessed changes to the perception of the role of the artists and art, the effects of which are still experienced today. The Romantic phenomenon continued for the next four decades; the works of the above two poets, as well as those of Byron, P.B. Shelley, and Keats, and several lesser-known writers will be studied in the context of the diverse historical, social, intellectual, and artistic climate of the period.

Course Objectives

- 1. This course will further the students' knowledge of the romantic writers, some of which were introduced in EN 220.
- 2. This course will give students a thorough understanding of Romanticism and its impact on ensuing modern literature.
