### Required Texts

Tolkien, J.R.R. *The Lord of the Rings*. Any edition or issue of *LOTR* is adequate. Tolkien's appendices are desirable elements in any text of *LOTR*, but they are not essential to course content, so single-volume editions that often omit the appendices will serve perfectly well.

Note: the instructor will supplement the text with class handouts as needed.

#### **Course Objectives**

J.R.R. Tolkien's *The Lord of the Rings* stands as one of the twentieth-century's greatest literary achievements—all the more so because Middle-earth offers so complete a spiritual dimension, one best understood as Christian. The goal of English 405 lies with understanding as fully as possible the ways in which Tolkien's work engages such issues as good and evil, fate and freewill, mind and body, life after death, wisdom, and stewardship of the environment. The course will also examine Peter Jackson's recent cinematic adaptation of *LOTR* to inquire after the successes and shortcomings of so ambitious a project. **Because the course will move rather briskly all participants should have read** *The Lord in the Rings* in advance. Knowledge of *The Hobbit* and *The Silmarillion* as well as Jackson's films are definite assets, but not requirements, for the course.
