## **Course Description**

This course considers the life of Jesus of Nazareth according to the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke (the 'Synoptic Gospels').

Key subjects include the Parables of Jesus, the Kingdom of God, the common and distinctive features of the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke, introduction to the contemporary debate on the historical Jesus, introduction to the Synoptic Problem (how the Gospels relate to each other), Jesus' ethical teaching as it comes to expression in the Sermon on the Mount and other passages, various methods employed in interpreting the Gospels, and the role of the Gospel story of Jesus in the ongoing life and ministry of the Church today.

Prerequisite: NT 501 New Testament Foundations (or equivalent)

# Course Objectives

At the successful completion of this intermediate course in New Testament, students are expected to have achieved competence in the following areas:

- Insight into ways in which they can know and appreciate their vocation and identity in Christ
- 2 Understanding of the current debate about Jesus in the academic world and popular media
- 3 Knowledge of (1) the reasons why each of the Synoptic Gospels was written, (2) the major theological ideas found in each Gospel, and (3) the literary and argumentative structure of each Gospel
- 4 Ability to exegete and interpret the Synoptic Gospels according to a clearly articulated hermeneutic
  - Word study using Greek-language tools
  - Use of a synopsis
  - Redaction-critical & literary study
- Facility to apply the teaching of the Gospels in solving problems faced in Christian life and the world today

## Course Requirements

Parables and redaction criticism paper (40%)

Students are required to write an exegetical paper (double-spaced, max. sixteen pages) examining four parables in the Synoptic Gospels. At least two of the parables must found in all three Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke). For those two parables, students are required to do a redactional study of those parables. The method will be explained in class. Students are required to enter into close dialogue with the course textbook, *The Parables* 

of Jesus: A Commentary, as well as at least two other secondary sources (commentaries, journal articles).

Due date: Thursday, February 15

#### Thematic or exegetical paper (30%)

Students are to write a (nine-ten page, double-spaced) thematic or exegetical paper on a topic or passage of the student's choice from the subject matter covered in the course. Guidelines for researching and writing papers will be distributed in class. In addition, students are required to read and apply principles learned in *The Craft of Research*.

### Final Examination (30%)

The final examination covers key content in the course.
