



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Course Description

This course helps the student develop a rule of life that fits their personality, season of life, and unique situation. It explores the nature and goal of spiritual formation, as well examines our rich inheritance of spiritual practices from Scripture and church history. The student will also be asked to undertake an intensive study of one biblical or historical figure in light of that individual's spiritual formation (and, if warranted, deformation). Overall, the emphasis will be on the student cultivating increasing Christ-likeness expressed through their God-given personality.

Requirement for the Myers Briggs Type Indicator

Students have paid a fee which enabled students to take the Myers Briggs Type Indicator electronically, receive a professionally generated description of their type and its application, and establish their profile in the Ministry Placement Office for future use. The MBTI profile will be used in PT 710 Ministry Values and Practice also. Students must complete the MBTI instrument one week from the beginning of class in order to profit from the interpretation later in the semester. Details will be sent to students' Ambrose emails.

Dr. Yeung is the Honorary Advisory Pastor of Kitchener Waterloo Chinese Alliance Church. He has served in the pastoral ministry in Canadian Chinese churches since 1979 in Canada. He was the adjunct professor at Tyndale Seminary of Toronto, visiting lecturer at Hong Kong Alliance Seminary, lecturer at Central and South America Alliance Bible College. He received his Doctor of Ministry degree from Fuller Theological Seminary, USA in 1987, and his Master of Divinity degree from Westminster Theological Seminary, USA in 1979. He authors a series of Chinese Bible Study Guide for personal reflection and small group discussion: *His Story: the life of Christ, His Majesty: the Divinity and Humanity of Christ, His Revelation: the book of Revelation.*

Expected Learning Outcomes

Students will be able to

- 1. Integrate the work of God to redeem, regenerate, sanctify His children for His glory
- 2. Appreciate the development of spiritual formation and discipline in church history.
- 3. Examine the views and practices of spirituality in the Chinese church
- 4. Understand their personality types from the Myers Briggs Type Indicator
- 5. Re-examine the current status of their own spiritual life
- 6. Equip to engage in the Biblical process of their spiritual development to conform to the image of Christ
- 7. Develop a biblical, personal and pastoral plan of spiritual formation

Course Requirements

1. Write three three-page reading reports from the following reading. (30%)

- *The Gospel of John chapters 13, 17, 20, 21*
- The Gospels of Luke 4:1-30; Mark 1: 29-39; Matthew 11:28-30, 12:1-21; Luke 23:1-49
- Simpson, A. B. *A Larger Christian Life* Camp Hill: Christian Publications, 1988 2. Read 1,000 pages from the recommended textbooks. Submit a reading log to the instructor, stating the percentage of the 1,000 pages you have read. (5%)
- 3. Course Project. To integrate the course materials learn in the class, a 15-page project with footnotes and bibliography will be assigned in this course. (45%)

Project:

- Study a biblical or historical character with a focus on his/her process of spiritual formation.
- Other (Project must be pre-approved by the instructor.)
- 4. Personal reflection paper. Students write a self-reflective paper (5 pages) on the following areas of personal-spiritual development: God's re-creation to be a new person in Christ, Transforming Emotions with the Fruit of the Spirit, Renewing of the Mind by God's Word, Sanctifying Life priorities based on God's calling. (20%)

Attendance Policy

Students are advised that they are expected to attend all weekend. Given that this is a weekend module course, it is extremely important that you attend 100% of the class time.

Assignments & Due Dates:

- 1. The reading reports and reading assignment are to be submitted in class on Oct 23, 2013.
- 2. The personal reflection paper is to be submitted in class on Oct 26, 2013.
- 3. The course project is to be submitted via the PT501-CLMoodle site on Nov 29, 2013. It may be submitted in either English or Chinese.

Please note that final grades will be available on your student portal. Printed grade sheets are no longer mailed out.

An appeal for change of grade on any course work must be made to the course instructor within one week of receiving notification of the grade. An appeal for change of final grade must be submitted to the Office of the Registrar in writing within 30 days of receiving notification of the final grade, providing the basis for appeal. A review fee of \$50.00 must accompany the appeal to review final grades. If the appeal is sustained, the fee will be refunded.

5. **Important Notes/Dates:** The last day to enter a weekend course without permission and /or voluntary withdrawal from a course without financial and academic penalty (**drop**: for courses with three weekends – Noon on the first Saturday; for courses with two weekends – end of the second evening of the first weekend. These courses will not appear on the student's transcript. Please notify the Registrar's Office atregistrar@ambrose.edu, if you wish to drop a class.

Students may change the designation of any class from credit to audit, or drop out of the "audit" up to the "drop" date indicated above. After that date, the original status remains and the student is responsible for related fees. If you wish to change to audit, please notify the Registrar's Office atregistrar@ambrose.edu.

Withdrawal from courses after the Registration Revision period will not be eligible for tuition refund. The last day to voluntarily withdraw from a course without academic penalty (*withdraw*): for classes with three weekends – the end of the 2nd weekend; for classes with two weekends, Friday 9 AM of the second weekend. A grade of "W" will appear on the student's transcript.

Students wishing to withdraw from a course, but who fail to do so by the applicable date, will receive the grade earned in accordance with the course syllabus. A student obliged to withdraw from a course after the Withdrawal Deadline because of health or other reasons may apply to the Registrar for special consideration.
