

PT 645.1-W Transforming Your Life, Congregation and Community Through Prayer (3) February 2005 Instructor: T.V. Thomas

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Course Description:

With balanced biblical undergriding, it seeks to help diligent followers of Jesus to develop prayer-directed personal lives, explore creative ways to sustain prayer-energized congregations which impact the communities they are located in.

Course Objectives:

- 1. To gain a biblical understanding of the promise, process and goal of spiritual transformation.
- 2. To examine the uniqueness and different aspects of Christian prayer.
- 3. To evaluate one's prayer life in light of Jesus' teaching and modeling of prayer.
- 4. To understand the relationship of temperament, personality type and approaches in transformative prayer.
- 5. To foster an enriching experience in personal and corporate prayer.
- 6. To explore creative strategies to equip and engage the congregation in sustainable prayerenergized ministry.
- 7. To develop a biblical worldview and ministry that fulfils God's Kingdom-style transformation in the community.
