Course Description

The course studies the historical theology and practice of Christian prayer through the centuries as it pertains to understanding the role of prayer within the spiritual life. It is taught from an ecumenical perspective and includes a practicum in lectio divina.

Course Objectives

- To survey highlights in the development of the practice and understanding of Christian prayer from the first to the twenty-first centuries;
- To expose the student to prayer 'classics' in the Protestant, Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox traditions;
- To expand the student's awareness of approaches to prayer outside his/her own experience and church tradition;
- To raise the student's consciousness as to the essential role of prayer in living a spiritual life;
- To give guidance in the discipline of praying with Scripture (lectio divina).

Course Requirements and Grading

A. Attendance at all prayer-practicum sessions.

- B. A **review/response paper** (6-8 pages) on <u>The Way of the Pilgrim</u> which:
 - 1. Summarizes the contents of the book and explains its relationship to the title (5 marks);
 - 2. Summarizes the nature of the prayer experience according to the book (10 marks);
 - 3. Reflects on the potential contributions which the book could make to the student's own experience / practice of prayer (7 marks);
 - 4. Identifies 5 significant questions which the book raises in the student's mind (5 marks);
 - 5. Gives an overall impression/evaluation of the book (3 marks).

DUE: Tuesday, October 16/2007 (30% of final grade)

- C. A **review/response paper** (6-8 pages) on Martin Luther, <u>A Simple Way to Pray</u> which includes the following:
 - 1. A discussion of the relationship between the title and the contents of the book; (5 marks)
 - 2. A summary of Luther's understanding of the nature and content of the prayer experience; (10 marks)
 - 3. A discussion of Luther's 'prayer techniques' and their relevance to the student's personal prayer journey; (10 marks)
 - 4. An overall evaluation/impression of Luther's treatise. (5 marks)

DUE: Tuesday, November 13/2007 (30% of the final grade)

- D. A **prayer journal**, based on the 3 prayer practicums, which includes the following:
 - 1. A separate entry for each practicum session (make sure the entries are dated);
 - 2. A record of physical and emotional responses and images/insights/impressions received in each session:
 - 3. A written prayer based on the assigned Scripture for each practicum;
 - 4. An overall evaluation of the value of this style of praying for your own spiritual journey and the church, collectively. Discuss strengths and weaknesses.

Important Notes:
