Personal Formation and Development

Course Objectives

This course will provide students with the means to assess their person formation and growth to date. It will require them to plan steps of growth that will guide them in making choices either while in seminary or while entering ministry. It will use insights from the Christian spiritual tradition, from psychology in the form of the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator. It will provide a structure for evaluating personal vocational development and sexuality as these bear on preparing for and applying ministry.

Learning Outcomes

Students will be able to:

- evaluate their spiritual formation in light of Christian Trinitarian faith
- evaluate their spiritual formation in the light of classic spiritual cultures and "maps" of Christian formation
- evaluate the development of their sense of vocation to Christian ministry
- assess their sexual development in light of vocation to Christian ministry
- assess their personal formation in terms of the Myers Briggs Type Indicator
- test their understanding of communication in a post-modern world

Requirement for the Myers Briggs Type Indicator

Students have paid a fee which enables students to take the MBTI electronically, receive a professionally generated description of their type and its application, and establish their profile in the Ministry Placement Office for future use. The MBTI profile will be used in PT710 also. Students must complete the MBTI instrument one week from the beginning of class in order to profit from the interpretation of the instrument later in the semester. Students' email addresses will be collected on the first day of class in order to begin this process. Advisory regarding Ambrose email addresses.

Every student is assigned an Ambrose email address at the start of the semester. The address is *first initial*, *last name@ambrose.edu*. Example: pralph@ambrose.edu. All correspondence relating to this course will take place with this address. This includes all handout material related to class.

Student Numbers and paper processing

Papers will be submitted and returned electronically. Papers will be identified by student numbers and not by student names. This allows for greater latitude with personal and subjective factors.

Professor's availability

Evening class students wishing to speak with the professor may arrange an appointment between 5 and 6:30pm on Monday evenings. Drop in meetings are subject to availability.

Foreseen absences

Students who are aware that they will for any reason miss any portion of the class will submit to the professor their own learning design to make up the missed time.

Textbooks and Pre-Course Reading

Diane Schoemperlen's *Our Lady Of The Lost And Found* is required. Schomperlen's novel will prove to be quite out of the ordinary reading. Class discussion will feature this book. Students will submit a book reflection paper describing how they would engage the author of the book in a spiritual conversation.

Students will complete 1125 pages of reading including the course text and any choices from the recommended reading list. Substitute reading material may be negotiated with the instructor. Students will submit a (minimum) three-page report of each book read. The report will include a brief (one page maximum) analysis of the content of the reading, and an assessment (at least two pages) of the relevance of the material to the student's present and future formation as discussed in class. The ability to integrate across topics will be a key to success in this report. *Note: in view of the lectureship which opened the class on Sept. 15, students are advised to include Paul Young's "The Shack"* as part of their reading for the first paper on spirituality.

Reading Reports

Students will choose readings that correspond to class topics, and will read as added learning for their assigned papers. Reports of this reading may be handed in at the same time as the papers to which they relate.

Assigned Papers

Paper 1. Personal Formation, my Spirituality and my vocation (will assess the student's formation, including the categories discussed in class, and their assessment of calling to God, the world and ministry: Please note, a "personal testimony" alone will not fulfill the requirements of this paper.)

Paper 2. Personal Formation and my Temperament (will assess the student's present and future development in terms of the Myers Briggs Type Indicator.)

Paper 3. Personal Formation and my Sexuality (will assess personal and ministry-related issues in sexuality according to class discussions)

Paper 4. Personal Formation: an Integration (will integrate course material, reading, previous learning and experience, and will offer short-term and long-term plans for future choices based on this integration.)

Attendance Policy

Paper Format

Seminary papers are to follow the guidelines of *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers*, *Theses and Dissertations*, by Kate L. Turabian (6th edition) and/or *The Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* (Fourth edition). The instructor will indicate where these guidelines may be waived or substituted. Students will identify, on the first or cover page of all assignments, the course name, the instructor's name and their own name (student ID numbers are optional) and their mail box number. Students will refrain from using graphics of any kind in preparing papers. Papers will be double-spaced, no more and no less, whether between lines or between paragraphs. All type will be 12 point. Book reflections will show the total number of pages read per book on the title page of the paper.
